It is always a challenge to keep an old facility upgraded to provide modern and first class accommodations. This has required a continual effort on our part. After the fire in 1970, we I later purchased the Tepee Motel and the Mid Town Motel, both of which were contiguous to the forty-two unit Three Bear Lodge. We I had-upgraded when we I could and eventually consolidated the three motels into one. This eliminated the need to maintain three offices but also required that all three were nearly equivalent in quality. There was a need to redo from scratch and go all the way through the properties with a major remodel. We made A decision was made to either tear down or strip to the studs the old section of the motel that had not been rebuilt after the fire. We made an announcement in the local paper that we would have a newly upgraded facility in 1990. We tore down one section, put in a basement to accommodate snowmobile rental clothing and hot tubs, put in all new electrical and water supply system in another section. And-This gave a face lift to the entire property; We made-making the Tepee and Midtown rooms larger and upgradinged the exterior, giving it the same look as the rest of the new Three Bear Lodge.

Over the years I have benefited from a drafting class I took my senior year of high school. that I took when I was a senior in high school. With almost every project I have undertaken, I get-take out my scale ruler, graph paper and lay out to scale-measure room sizes, furniture, exterior and interior designs. I had to be able to visualize and see the end result before beginning. From this experience I will be forever indebted to Mike Wilson, Frank Turner, and others who tutored me in remodeling skills; getting more mileage out of the money available, by doing some of the designing and hands on construction. I have laid hundreds of rooms of carpet, tiled many bathrooms and stained or painted many, many rooms and apartments. It gives me some pleasure after all these years as I walk through various rooms and remember when I laid *that* tile or made *this* wooden furniture or designed and built *that* building.

There is something about By looking back over the things we I have accomplished with some satisfaction that it causes us me to do a good better job on future projects. I remember, when I was about 11 years old eleven-years-old we my family and others were remodeling our the church house. I went with my dad to help and was asked to fill the nail holes in the baseboard

so they the finish coat could be applied put on them. Though it was a simple job, my dad showed me how to push the putty in and smooth it out so it was hardly noticeable. Years later, when walking into that church house, I would sometimes glance down at those baseboards and remember that I had a part in hiding the nail holes that were now invisible. One of the highlights of my dad's life was also his contribution to working on the church house in Twin Groves, Idaho which still stands, but is no longer owned by the Church.

Not long Soon after we had completed rebuilding the Three Bear Lodge because due to the of the fire in 1970, the Morris Motel came up for sale. Frank Turner and I, having become being such good friends fast friends, began to wonder thought about going into business together and the Morris Motel seemed to be an opportunity that we should pursue. The Morris Motel was a rose colored cinder block fifty-two unit motel named after Ed and Edna Morris and his wife Edna. Ed had passed on and Edna remarried Gene Adams. They Tired from running the motel and were getting up in age, they put it on the market.

We Frank and I enquired about purchasing the motel and then began the serious negotiations. The motel was in needed of a face lift and they had no desire to do so. Our intention was to completely refurbish, and even rename the motel, as we wanted to make it one of the nicest motels in town. Our problem was we had little money to make a down payment and where would we find it? if we made the down payment, where would be able to get the remodeling money? I had bought Three Bear Lodge with the help of the Wilsons. However, I didn't have the relationship with the Adams as I did the Wilsons.

We had There was a problem, not having enough money to both buy and remodel before we opened. During the negotiations we discovered they also had a problem. They The Adams were in a financial bracket that would have taken most of the down payment and they didn't want to be paid off all at once but wanted to carry the contract. I remember Frank and I, Gene and Edna sat sitting in their apartment when an idea hit that was so far out I hardly dared mention it. But

I have learned over the years that sometimes there are promptings that just cannot shouldn't be ignored, so I proposed the following: They wanted to sell the motel to us under contract with a \$50,000 down payment, but didn't want the money, especially that year, for tax purposes. They were equally concerned about selling their motel with no wanting assurance that it would be taken care of. They wanted to make sure we were committed and felt we should put down a payment some money to show our commitment. That This is when I suggested a purchase agreement that probably which stands today as a unique down payment option.

I suggested that Frank and I would put \$50,000 into remodeling the motel over the winter months. We would Then completely redo the interior of every room, paint the exterior and rename the motel to the Ambassador Motor Inn. This would showed our commitment and if we lost the place they would be able to could repossess it in a new and improved condition. Our The down payment would be considered the \$50,000 we put in using it for remodeling and we would carrying the contract on with the balance over the next 20 years.

To our surprise they accepted the offer. I remember Frank shaking his head, coming out of that meeting and saying, "I do not understand what just happened." The arrangement was finalized and we took our pick-ups to Salt Lake City for many loads of interior paneling, which was the craze at that time. We painted the exterior of the motel an off-white with green trim and had a large sign designed for saying the "Ambassador Motor Inn". Our The \$50,000 down payment went totally all to remodeling, and we startinged off with a new looking motel. The first real payment came due after the remodeling was done and we had a year's income. Not many deals like that are available any more.

It wasn't long before we hired Bill and Carole Howell to manage the Ambassador and the marketing for Frank's motel the Big Western Pine, my Three Bear Lodge and the snowmobile operation. We Realizinged we now had there was more than the two of us-we could do handle, so eventually workinged Bill and Carole into the ownership of the Ambassador. Frank would eventually wanted to retire so Bill, I, and my brother Sylvan bought him out of the Big Western Pine and the snowmobile operation which we named Yellowstone Arctic. That purchase

eventually led to Bill and I buying Frank's share of the Ambassador and we operated rather progressively for the next few years.

Later we sold the Big Western Pine, now the Country Inn and Suites, Rustlers Roost Restaurant and Lounge, and the Buckboard Motel. Yellowstone Tour and Travel was formed as our marketing entity which later became authorized to sell airline tickets and was the town's only full service travel agency. Bill Howell and I owned the following properties together in a partnership that has lasted for more than thirty years: S & H Services, Yellowstone Tour and Travel, built and operated the Holiday Inn, Oregon Shortline Restaurant and Iron Horse Saloon, Yellowstone Arctic/ Yamaha, and the Ambassador Apartments. Linda and I owned Three Bear Lodge/ Restaurant and Snowmobile Rentals, built and operated the Econo Mart, gas station, laundromat, and car wash, See Yellowstone snowcoach and summer van tours, Bear's Den Cinema and meeting facility, Lapp's Cabins, Mountain Village Apartments, and Parade Rest Guest Ranch.

The above businesses and the fact that I have always surrounded myself with good people has allowed me to reach out and spread myself a little further by being on local committees. I have always enjoyed doing things to help other people. That is the way I was raised. After all, what is the point of having blessings, if there is no sharing among friends? you can't share them with your friends? By helping to organize and participate in committees, I not only helped other people but also myself, for a rising tide raises all boats.
